

Research Assignment Summer 2009

The goal of this course is to raise awareness of current events and their connections to the domestic and international political scenes. Understanding the American government's position on an issue and its involvement to resolve it as a member of the international community are key components of our program. Alongside national governments, NGOs (Non Governmental Organizations) provide help on a variety of issues. While NGOs such as *Amnesty International* and *Doctors Without Borders* are well known in the humanitarian field, there are many more that are involved around the world in scientific, technological, environmental, economic, educational, health and other aspects.

Expectations

1. Go to the following website <http://www.reliefweb.int/rw/rwc.nsf/doc202?OpenForm> and select ONE NGO that provides a service **you are interested in**. (They are listed in alphabetical order; take the time to investigate)
2. Research the **background** of the NGO
 - ✓ Who founded it and when?
 - ✓ Where is its base office located and why?
 - ✓ How is it financed?
 - ✓ What is its goal?
3. Explore the **present involvement** (2009) of the NGO in the world
 - ✓ Location of the issue
 - ✓ Reason for involvement
 - ✓ Means used to resolve the issue (financial support, advisors, experts, etc.)
 - ✓ Timetable of mission (from start to finish)
 - ✓ Connection to any government, other NGOs or international agencies
 - ✓ US connection to this NGO if any (this may take a bit of digging)
4. **Connect** with a member of the organization
 - ✓ Email the NGO (use the *contact us* link)
 - ✓ Explain your interest and list any questions you may have
 - ✓ Connect with someone who is presently involved in the mission you are researching
 - ✓ Get specific details on his or her personal responsibilities and activities
 - ✓ Keep a log of the exchanges (minimum of three sets; can be with different people)
5. **Research Paper Format**
 - Heading (name, class and date) and title (name of NGO and its current mission)
 - Typed, double spaced, Time News Roman 12 font, 1 inch margins
 - Three to five pages long (not counting sources page or log)
 - Answer **ALL** questions clearly and concisely (NO cutting and pasting of website postings as that would be plagiarism, but you can use short quotations)
 - Attach contact log to the paper (entries **MUST** be dated and **CAN** be cut and pasted from your emails and your contact's responses)

6. Paper Sections

1. *Introduction*: your reason for selection and overall interest; NGO's main field of action (humanitarian, economic, environmental, etc.)
2. *First section*: background information - presentation of general facts
3. *Second section*: present involvement and evaluation of success of mission
4. *Third section*: analysis of log and information gathered
5. *Conclusion*: personal reaction to choice and NGO's present actions
6. *Sources page*: NGO's main webpage address and any other sources you may have used in your research; must be in MLA or APA format (see Library Media Center)
7. *Attachment*: contact log
