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SUMMARY & BACKGROUND

On March 11, 2021, the President signed into law the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARP). ARP makes available \$122.8 billion nationally in a third round of Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funds. New York State has been allocated nearly \$9 billion under the ARP Act's Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Fund. The ARP Act requires that a minimum of \$8.09 billion (90 percent) be allocated to LEAs, including charter schools and Special Act School Districts that are LEAs. Pursuant to the terms of the ARP Act, LEA allocations have been calculated using the relative shares of grants awarded under Title I, Part A of the ESEA for the most recent federal fiscal year (2020). Each eligible LEA's ARP-ESSER allocation may be found [HERE](#).

Under section 2001(d)(2) of ARP Act of 2021, each State Educational Agency (SEA) must make ARP-ESSER allocations to LEAs in an expedited and timely manner and, to the extent practicable, not later than 60 days after the SEA receives its ARP-ESSER funds. The first portion of ARP-ESSER Funds was awarded to states on March 24, 2021, and 60 days from that day is May 24, 2021. The U.S. Department of Education (USDE) has taken the position that an SEA makes allocations when it authorizes the LEA to begin to obligate funds in accordance with its needs. To enable New York State's LEAs to begin to obligate ARP-ESSER funds by USDE's May 24, 2021 deadline, the application for LEA 90% base ARP-ESSER allocations is being administered by NYSED as a two-part application process:

ARP-ESSER Application – Part 1: The first step was for each LEA to submit signed assurances to NYSED by May 24, 2021. Upon receipt of signed LEA assurances, NYSED provided an email notice to the LEA of substantially approvable application status. Upon receipt of such notice, LEAs were able to begin obligating their allocation of 90% base ARP-ESSER funds.

ARP-ESSER Application – Part 2: The second step will be the submission of a full application and budget by the LEA. NYSED will issue a Grant Award Notice (GAN) to the LEA after the LEA's application is fully reviewed and approved by NYSED. Part 2 will address several of the plan-related assurances an LEA must provide in Part 1 of the application process.

The ARP Act requires LEAs to reserve at least 20% of their 90% ARP-ESSER allocation to address learning loss through the implementation of evidence-based interventions, such as summer learning or summer enrichment, extended day, comprehensive afterschool programs, or extended school year programs, and ensure that such interventions respond to students' academic, social, and emotional needs and address the disproportionate impact of the coronavirus on economically disadvantaged students, children with disabilities, English learners, racial and ethnic minorities, migrant students, students experiencing homelessness, and children and youth in foster care. APPLICATION PROCESS FOR LEA ALLOCATIONS OF ARP-ESSER SEA RESERVE FUNDS

The federal ARP statute requires SEAs to reserve:

not less than 5 percent of the total amount of grant funds awarded to the State (\$449.4 million) to carry out activities to address the impact of lost instructional time by supporting the implementation of evidence-based interventions;

not less than 1 percent (\$89.9 million) to carry out the implementation of evidence-based summer enrichment programs; and

not less than 1 percent (\$89.9 million) to carry out the implementation of evidence-based comprehensive afterschool programs.

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Title VIII of Division B of the CARES Act directs the Department to carry out the Education Stabilization Fund, of which the ARP ESSER funds are a part. Section 2001 of the ARP Act provides for the Department to make grants to each SEA from the ARP ESSER funds. 1. **In the space provided below, please describe how the LEA meaningfully engaged a diverse and representative set of the applicable stakeholders in developing a plan to use these funds and implementing that plan.**

To ensure that the UFSD of the Tarrytowns engaged in meaningful consultation with representatives consisting of district parents, district staff and community members, our Assistant Superintendent for Business sent out a survey to members of those groups. This survey was created in both English and Spanish and included a description and background of the American Rescue Plan as well as the amount of funding that the district could expect to receive, with the learning loss component clearly specified. The survey asked the participants to indicate what group they would best identify as (parent/guardian, community member or district employee). The survey was available in both English and Spanish.

The survey then asked participants to check off all areas that they feel that the district should consider funding under the ARP. The participant could indicate as many areas as they wished. The following potential areas for use of funding were listed on the survey.

*increased reading materials to support the district-wide English Language Arts Program

* resources to support social and emotional learning

* projects to enhance filtration, ventilation and airflow in school buildings

* creation of a Writing Center

* creation of Maker Spaces to enhance STEAM Program (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Math)

* restructuring the middle and high school library to better accommodate student needs

* purchases to create flexible learning spaces in classrooms

* expanding after school programming

* expanding summer programming

* purchasing software and hardware technology, including Wifi and hotspots

The survey also allowed for ample space for the participant to write about anything additional that was not on the list that they thought would be a beneficial use of ARP funding.

To date, the Business Office has received 151 responses to the survey. Based on this feedback and extensive meetings involving district level and building level administration and teachers, the district prioritized what programs, materials, staffing etc would be allocated in our ARP budget.

In order to continue to engage in meaningful dialogue throughout implementation of the Plan, our district level administration will keep our community, parents and staff apprised of all ARP funded programs by including this information in our monthly newsletter, adding it to our website and discussing it at Board of Education meetings. If for any reason, one of the planned components of the ARP budget needs to be substituted for another initiative, another survey will go out to parents, staff and community members asking for their feedback once again.

- 3. In the space provided below, please describe the extent to which and how the funds will be used to implement prevention and mitigation strategies that are, to the greatest extent practicable, consistent with the most recent CDC guidance on reopening schools, in order to continuously and safely open and operate schools for in-person learning.**

Recent guidance from the CDC, dated August 5, 2021, indicates that improving ventilation is an important COVID-19 prevention strategy that can reduce the number of virus particles in the air. This is especially true when combined with other mitigation strategies including frequent hand washing, mask wearing and social distancing. Bringing fresh outdoor air into a building helps keep virus particles from concentrating inside. This can be done by opening multiple doors and windows, using child-safe fans to increase the effectiveness of open windows, and making upgrades to or replacing to HVAC or air filtration systems. Classrooms were chosen for this work based on the square footage of the classroom space as well as how many students typically are assigned to that room.

The district is choosing to implement prevention and mitigation strategies that are consistent with CDC guidance on safely reopening schools. The district is funding a capital project across all of our school buildings. The capital project consists of replacing many of the original classroom ventilation systems with new ventilation and air conditioning units that met the standards for mitigating the spread of COVID-19. In addition to the equipment and labor involved with each of the three building projects, we have also allocated construction management costs and architect/engineering costs

Additionally we have allocated funding to pay for the cost of clerical staff to assist our nursing staff with contact tracing.

- 4. In the space provided below, please describe the data that the LEA will use to identify student needs and monitor student progress as a result of planned interventions and supports.**

Students will be chosen for participation in any After School or Summer Programming based on academic progress (or lack thereof) in the prior school year. Lack of progress will be measured using report card grades, internal assessments, teacher feedback and attendance. It is the intent that any student needing this assistance and who can adhere to regular attendance in the program, can participate. If more students are in need of the program than there are seats, then the intent will be that the district will fund additional sections from other funding sources.

Progress will be monitored by the Coordinator or Head Teacher of each program (along with the Building Principal and Asst Supt for Curriculum & Instruction,), who will monitor report card data, internal assessments, attendance and teacher/parent/student feedback to ensure that this planned support is working for each individual student.

5. **In the space provided below, please describe how the LEA will use the funds it reserves under section 2001(e)(1) - the required reserve of 20% of funds - to address the academic impact of lost instructional time through the implementation of evidence-based interventions, such as summer learning or summer enrichment, extended day, comprehensive afterschool programs, or extended school year.**

Again, based on our survey feedback and extensive meetings with staff, we have identified numerous ways in which our ARP funding will address the learning loss and lost instructional time experienced by students during this pandemic. Each area that ranked high on our survey as an area that the parents, community and staff that participated in the survey would like to see funded as well as was also important to our teaching staff and school leaders is outlined in bold below, followed by the program/initiative/material/staffing that will be placed in the budget.

Increasing reading materials to support the district-wide English Language Arts Program. The district is purchasing Shared Reading Libraries, Classroom Libraries, Guided Reading Kits and leveled texts across grade levels, K-8 as well as Reading Teacher Kits for k-6 Reading Teachers.

Resources to support social and emotional learning. This will include Branching Minds Training and Individual Teacher Coaching using a Multi-Tiered System of Supports to assist struggling learners, a Teen Mental Health and First Aid training and Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports through our local BOCES. Additionally we are going to support the cost of a licensed Social Worker through Family Services of Westchester to assist with specific student needs.

Creation of a Writing Center. We are planning on reshaping the library space at our shared middle and high school library to include adding a fully staffed Writing Lab. This is a capital project.

Purchases to create flexible learning spaces in classrooms. We are purchasing stand-up student desks. Many recent studies have shown that standing desks helps students struggling with ADHD and behavioral problems, as well as the nation-wide problem with childhood obesity. More fat is burned standing then sitting.

Expanding after school programming. We are expanding out after school programs in every building by adding sections, teachers and/or length to the program.

Expanding summer programming. During the summer of 2023 we are going to be having robust and varied summer programming for students at every grade level starting with a grade K-2 Summer Math Academy, grade 3-5 Summer Math and Summer Literacy Program and ELA/Math Summer Programs for Middle and High School. We will also have specialized summer programs including a Living Environment Clinic specifically for ENL students, and ENL Bootcamp for Middle School and a Summer Science Camp operated by the national company, Regeneron and their DNA Learning Center.

Purchasing software. This will include building site licenses for software specific to the needs of ENL students

We received many write-in responses indicating that they would like to see additional funding allocated specifically toward the needs of **Dual Language and ENL students** to assist with closing the persistent achievement gap amongst these student demographics. To that end we have decided to purchase Classroom Libraries for ENL students, Spanish books for Dual language classrooms, Dual language Kindergarten Reading Kits, bilingual dictionaries, language assessment tools and procure the services of Papercup, a service that translates and dubs video and content into Spanish.

Another popular response that we have decided to allocate funding towards is for the expansion of our **High School Academy Program**. This program provides an alternate schedule for those students that need it with start times in the afternoon and ending in the early evening, as well as credit recovery opportunities. Expanding this program is more important then ever because so many students are behind in the number of credits they need to graduate due to the pandemic. We are also piloting a **similar program at the middle school** level since earning regents credit for course can start in middle school.

Lastly, we received feedback for increased **services for our Special Education Students**. During the summer of 2023 we are going to operate a Special Education Summer learning Academy. We are also funding the Humanities Team at the high school, which focuses on building their skill levels, executive functioning and motivation of our special needs population through hands-on activities, college trips and field trips. We are also adding two Special Education teachers to our elementary team as well as three Teaching Assistants to provide one on one and personalized support.

Our remaining funds are being used to pay for storage and moving fees that we incurred during the pandemic. The storage was used for furniture that needed to be removed so that extra space to move about and social distance could be created, as well as for the huge amounts of PPE that we purchased.

Our capital project replace our old ventilation systems with new ventilation and air conditioning systems that meet the standards for mitigating the spread of COVID-19, will respond to the overall health needs of our students by allowing them to continually breath filtered air in the classroom. Providing a large scale improvement such as this has the immediate benefit of improving student overall health, which in turn can increase many other areas of wellness, including increased academic performance.

Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports Training is a three tired evidence based approach desgined to improve and integrate all of the data, systems, and practices affecting student outcomes--academic, emotional, psychological and behavioral. This work will particularly impact the population of students most adversely effected by the COVID-19 pandemic which include low income, homeless, and students of color.

Our extensive Aftter School and Summer Programming will respond to the immediate loss of learning experienced by students during the pandemic. All students in need will be invited to participate and the programs will consist of a wide range of disproportionately impacted students including ENL's, students with disabilities, students of color, low income and foster/homeless students.

ARP-ESSER Return to In-Person Instruction

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Section 2001(i)(1) of the ARP Act requires each LEA that receives ARP ESSER funds to develop and make publicly available on the LEA's website, not later than 30 days after receiving ARP ESSER funds, a plan for the safe return to in-person instruction and continuity of services for all schools, including those that have already returned to in-person instruction. The district has established a Committee administrators, teachers, staff, students, parents and community members. This Committee will review and update, no less then every 6 months, the district plan for continued in-person instruction as well as the plans needed if it becomes necessary to pivot to on-line instruction or a hybrid model. Reopening Committee that was established last Spring. Each time any guidance is updated, it will continue to go out for public comment before any changes are finalized. Any public comments will be collected via Board of Education emails, a disrict email address or a phone call to the Superintendents office.

We are planning two capital projects/construction activities.
 The first project is for the replacement of old (original to our buildings in some cases) ventilation systems with new ventilation and air conditioning systems that met COVID-19 standards for mitigation of the spread of the virus. Smaller classrooms will be prioritized for the project because students are less able to distance themselves from each other in a smaller setting.
 The second project is also part of our learning loss reserve. It is for the reconfiguration of the shared middle and high school library to allow for the creation of a Writing Lab. We have determined students' writing skills to be an area of concern that has been exacerbated by the pandemic. The Writing Center will be a separate area within the current library.
